Priority 2	Purchase online resources – Purple Mash, Learning Village, Spelling Shed. Provide devices to enable children to enrich their learning, linking school and home.

#### Wider strategies for current academic year

<u>Measure</u>	<u>Activity</u>
Priority 1	Breakfast and After School Club – offering disadvantaged families the opportunity for wrap around care without additional cost to them, subsequently encouraging better attendance.
Priority 2	Providing uniform, equipment, transport and school visit funding - allowing children to access school life fully and not be disadvantaged in comparison to their peers.
Children's barriers to learning that these priorities address	Children potentially disadvantaged in comparison to their peers due to family circumstances.

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### Monitoring and Implementation

<u>Area</u>	<u>Challenge</u>	<u>Mitigating action</u>
Priority 1	Ensuring enough time for class teachers to support staff development and allow time for interventions.	Timetabling allows all staff to work together across a year group to provide targeted interventions.
Priority 2	Ensuring children are confident using online platforms both within school and at home.	Teachers to ensure that tasks are pitched at an appropriately challenging level to encourage engagement and confidence. Use online platforms as part of Quality First Teaching within the classroom in order to ensure children can navigate, use and explain what they are doing to others, thus being able to use the platforms independently at home.
Wider strategies	Engaging the families facing most challenges.	Make sure that families are aware of the offer of support.

### Review: last year's aims and outcomes

<u>Aim</u>	<u>Outcome</u>
Develop children's metacognition skills across the school.	Children have a greater understanding of their own learning choices and behaviours.  In clearly putting the children at the centre of their own learning, they have developed a more reflective practise in their learning.
Support individual pupils in dealing with the social and emotional impact of arriving mid-year, or of friends leaving mid-year, therefore avoiding disengagement and underperformance.	All staff trained to work with all in-year admissions and leavers, as well as those children identified by staff in class as being affected by the loss of a close friend who has left the school mid-year.
Identify any barriers to learning upon arrival so that appropriate interventions are put in place without delay.	GL Assessment enables us to collect and analyse information about each child's natural reasoning ability, attitudes to learning and current performance, including any barriers to learning.  It gives us access to a range of assessments already standardised to an extremely high level, allowing comparison of performance within school and against a national benchmark. Accurate way of benchmarking and monitoring pupil progress.

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	<p>Uses national benchmark and Standard Age Scores.</p> <p>Generated reports are accurate and do not need marking by teachers; reducing time spent marking papers or decoding complex data tables.</p> <p>We can analyse pupil data easily with simple visual representations accompanied by narrative explanations.</p>
